The Reading is from Philippians 4:4-9

BRETHREN, rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you.

The Reading is from The Gospel of John 12:1-18

Six days before Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazaros was, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. There they made him a supper; Martha served, and Lazaros was one of those at table with him. Mary took a pound of costly ointment of pure nard and anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair; and the house was filled with the fragrance of the ointment. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (he who was to betray him), said "Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" This he said, not that he cared for the poor but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box he used to take what was put into it. Jesus said, "Let her alone, let her keep it for the day of my burial. The poor you always have with you, but you do not always have me." When the great crowd of the Jews learned that he was there, they came, not only on account of Jesus but also to see Lazaros, whom he had raised from the dead. So the chief priests planned to put Lazaros also to death, because on account of him many of the Jews were going away and believing in Jesus. The next day a great crowd who had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, crying, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, even the King of Israel!" And Jesus found a young donkey and sat upon it; as it is written, "Fear not, daughter of Zion; behold, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!" His disciples did not understand this at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that this had been written of him and had been done to him. The crowd that had been with him when he called Lazaros out of the tomb

and raised him from the dead bore witness. The reason why the crowd went to meet him was that they heard he had done this sign.

This has been a trying time for us all. Powerful, mixed emotions of fear, anger, anxiety, etc. can be and often are overwhelming. We need our faith and trust in God now more than ever. We are all home, except for those on the front-lines of this battle, whether healthcare workers, first responders, essential businesses, etc. Thank you to all those working to keep us safe and supplied with all the essentials. (Who knew how essential TP, hand sanitizer and disinfecting wipes are...and how hard to keep in stock.) I am thankful that our Governor Ron DeSantis has declared places of worship essential businesses. Nonetheless, all essential businesses are asked to practice social distancing and extreme hygiene practices as outlined by the CDC (which we have been doing).

There are some harsh policies in the Metropolitan's instructions but there are also hopeful and creative ways to practice our faith from home. Please read his whole message and do your best to enliven your Holy Week celebration from home, streaming our services as much as possible and engaging in them as fully as possible. Use your Holy Week book if you have one or better yet, download the services from: https://www.agesinitiatives.com/dcs/public/dcs/dcs.html. Light your candle on our website: www.saint-katherine.org, light your kandili (oil lamp), candles and incense at home, then stream our service on either Facebook Live or from our website on YouTube. Then as the Metropolitan suggests dress up, bow, kneel, stand and engage as fully as possible in the service. Bake prosforo, dye your eggs, decorate your home and make palm (or paper) crosses, etc.

Pray for those who are sick, who have been furloughed, lost their jobs or businesses. Pray for God's protection over and deliverance from this pandemic for your family, our community, state, nation and world. Pray that God will guide our President Trump and all state and local officials to get us back to work and worshipping together as soon as safely possible. We will do our best to offer and live stream all our Holy Week Services. (I have modified the Metropolitan's Holy Week Schedule to reflect our service offerings, so that there is no confusion with two schedules. Otherwise, his letter is intact and complete as enclosed below):

April 7, 2020

Beloved brothers and co-celebrants,

As we reach the culmination of our Lenten Journey, my thoughts and prayers

are with you, your family and your communities. I pray that God will strengthen you and inspire you to celebrate the Holy Week and Pascha services. Despite the very painful reality of not been able to celebrate in the traditional way that we have been accustomed to, I exhort you to evangelize your community through electronic media that you have in your disposal.

This year, our souls and those of the faithful are mourning not being able to come to our spiritual home and worship together because of the restrictions that are in place to protect us from the threat of COVID-19. Although we are physically unable to be present together in the church, our hearts and spirits will be joined in the services of Holy Week and Pascha.

As we approach the Passion of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, there will be some necessary changes to the schedule of services. Below are directives and guidelines to follow in setting the schedule for this sacred week. I encourage you to communicate with your parish council to ensure compliance with my pastoral instructions and with local laws. I ask that all clergy adhere to them so that we can have uniformity in the Holy and God-protected Metropolis of Atlanta.

The clergy must comply with national and local laws as well as executive orders in regards to gatherings, making sure to limit the number to as few individuals as possible NOT TO exceed 10, which includes the clergy, chanters, altar servers, etc. It is important to note the restriction of the number of people for gatherings apply to both indoor and outdoor gatherings.

The clergy must consider restrictive travel and curfew times when scheduling the services so that they begin and end BEFORE the curfew times are in affect. (Note: There is currently no curfew in Brevard County, Florida.)

The clergy should be faithful in offering all services unless exceptional circumstances arise. In those cases, notify the Chancellor to consider other options. To assist you, at the end of this letter a proposed Holy Week and Pascha schedule has been included.

With today's technology the clergy must remember that they are offering the services not only for their congregations, but for others that may be praying and participating in worship from other parts of the world.

In addition to the above, please follow Protocol 4-15 of our Metropolis, which

clearly outlines the proper use of vestments, and Altar coverings as well as the proper colors for each service of Holy Week and Pascha so that we can have uniformity.

Other than pastoral emergencies, clergy are not permitted to distribute Holy Communion or Holy Unction before, during or after services to any persons other than those who are designated to assist the clergy in the services.

For Palm Sunday, Holy Friday, Pascha, NONE of the traditional material offerings are to be distributed to the faithful in any way, including palms and/or pussy willows, flowers, candles, paschal light, eggs, etc.

Spiritual guidance to the faithful can be provided remotely using technological means, but the Sacrament of Holy Confession and the Prayer of Absolution cannot be offered via the telephone or via electronic media. For the Prayer of Absolution can only be given in person when the current crisis has passed.

The faithful should be reminded to worship at home the same way they would have done in church, by standing, kneeling, crossing themselves, and praying along in the services.

For Palm Sunday, we should encourage the faithful to make palm crosses out of paper or decorate their home with other greenery for that day in time for the blessing of the palms. On Holy Friday and Pascha, parishioners should light their candles, preferably from their kandili (oil lamp) if they have one. On Holy Friday for the Lamentations and on Pascha for the service of the Resurrection I ask that you encourage your parishioners to join their clergy in singing the beautiful hymns. Families should also gather to prepare and dye eggs for Pascha and have them ready for the blessing as part of the Resurrection Service.

For the Epitaphios (cloth), there is no need to decorate the entire Kouvouklion (Tomb), because of the difficulties to obtain flowers and the restriction not having people decorate it. Instead, prepare a small table or stand to place the Epitaphios in such a way that the cameras of the church can highlight it so that it can easily be seen by the people at home. Rather than process with the Kouvouklion outside the church, the procession this year will take place in the interior of the church carrying the Epitaphios as we do with the procession of

the Holy Crucifix on Holy Thursday evening.

The Resurrection service will take place on the Solea or at the Royal Doors, and not at any other place inside or outside of the church, so that the faithful can easily view the live stream service.

Although these are difficult circumstances, please use this sacred time to communicate and inspire your congregations to follow as faithfully as possible the services of Holy Week and Pascha.

Regardless of the circumstances we find ourselves in today, we always celebrate Pascha. Yes, this year will be unusual, however let us celebrate this Great Feast with unwavering conviction and resilient faith as the Body of Christ, His Holy Church. For though we are apart physically our hearts long for the moment that we may be able to be re-united as a family of God. May that day come soon by the Grace and power of our Resurrected Lord.

Wishing you, your families and communities a most blessed Holy Week and a glorious Pascha.
